<u>Isaac</u>, a tropical storm which meteorologists are predicting will strengthen into a category 2 or category 3 hurricane as it passes through the Gulf of Mexico, is barreling its way towards New Orleans. The storm is expected to make landfall in the city on the seventh anniversary of the Hurricane Katrina disaster.

Four southern states have declared emergencies, and the governors of Alabama and Louisiana have canceled their trips to the Republican convention in order to focus on disaster preparedness efforts. On August 29th, 2012, seven years to the day Katrina made landfall in New Orleans, Isaac is expected to hit. Katrina was declared one of the worst natural disasters in US history. Around a million people were evacuated from their homes and over a thousand people lost their lives in the devastating flooding that followed. One of the south's most productive cities was virtually wiped off the map within the space of a few hours. . Certainly the storm destroyed one of America's most decadent cities, making landfall on the same day that the "

found even ten righteous people in it (Genesis 18:32). He didn't find ten but He did provide a way whereby the three righteous that He did find could be saved. Peter 2:9. In the case of Nineveh, the entire city believed God, and judgement was averted (Jonah 3:10).
